ADMISSION

If you are interested in applying to a degree program or simply taking courses at Trinity College, the following information will aid you in completing the application for admission and other required materials. For complete details, please refer to the application packet, which may be requested by calling the Office of Admissions at 202/884-9400. Application materials may also be obtained online at <http://www.trinitydc.edu>.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

The requirements for admission vary by academic program, and complete details for each program may be obtained by contacting the Office of Admissions. All undergraduate applicants must have a high school diploma or a GED; applicants to graduate programs must have a minimum undergraduate GPA of 2.8 on a 4.0 scale from a regionally accredited college or university. The following materials are required for admission into any program:

- A completed and signed Application Form
- A nonrefundable application fee of \$40
- An essay or statement of purpose
- One or more letters of recommendation
- Official copies of academic records or transcripts

The School of Education also requires scores from the PRAXIS I Examination. Certain programs also require standardized test scores and a personal interview. Applicants should check with the Office of Admissions for specific requirements.

ADMISSION DECISIONS

The Office of Admissions evaluates an application once all supporting materials have been received. Completed applications that arrive by April 1 receive priority for admission. Applications that arrive after the priority deadline are considered as space becomes available.

FINANCIAL AID

Trinity College recognizes that today, more than ever before, investing in education requires planning, and so the College is prepared to assist students and their families in making higher education affordable through financial planning, counseling, and installment payment plans.

Financial aid is awarded on the basis of demonstrated and verifiable financial need as determined by subtracting the student's estimated contribution from the total cost of education for the respective academic year. Students applying for financial aid will be considered for all programs for which they are eligible, and assistance is generally a combination of grant, loan, and employment. Trinity participates in all Federal Title IV student financial assistance programs. You should contact the Office of Student Financial Services at 202/884-9530 as early as possible to discuss tuition planning for your college education.

GENERAL INFORMATION

SOURCES OF FINANCIAL AID

Trinity provides financial aid through its endowed scholarships, loan funds, and its allocation of non-endowed operating revenues. It also administers funds available through federal programs. Individuals should also seek aid from state and local programs for which they are eligible. Currently, about 90% of the student body receives some type of financial assistance.

Federal student aid programs offer financial assistance to students at the undergraduate and graduate levels although some programs restrict participation to undergraduates only. Federal programs include: Pell Grants, Federal Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grants, Subsidized and Unsubsidized Stafford Loans, PLUS Loans, Perkins Loans, and the Federal Work-Study Program.

Various state and local programs also provide student aid. If you are a resident of the District of Columbia, you may be eligible for the DC Tuition Assistance Grant Program or the DC Supplemental State Incentive Grant. Contact the Office of Student Financial Services for details.

APPLYING FOR FINANCIAL AID

To apply for financial aid, you must complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) or Renewal FAFSA. Trinity College's school code is **001460**. An application may be completed online at <http://www.fafsa.ed.gov>.

INVOICES AND PAYMENT

On the day you register, you must also complete a Payment Arrangement Form. This form must be submitted to the Business Office. A \$50 fee will be assessed if you do not submit your Payment Arrangement Form by **September 17, 2003**. You will receive a confirmation statement of your term and total charges in the mail. No student may enter classes until all fees and any previous balance have been paid in full or satisfactory arrangements for payment have been made. If you have questions or concerns about your payment, please contact the Business Office at 202/884-9500.

Check or Money Order

Checks should be made payable to Trinity College and sent to the Business Office, Trinity College, 125 Michigan Avenue, N.E., Washington, DC 20017. Make sure to include daytime telephone number on your check.

Credit Cards

You may pay for your tuition and fees at the Business Office using a credit card. Trinity College accepts MasterCard, Visa, and Discover. There is an additional charge of \$30 if payment is made in two installments.

Employer Vouchers

Trinity College also accepts employer vouchers from companies that assist their employees with tuition. If your employer provides financial assistance, you will need to submit a voucher *every semester* to generate employer billing at the time you seek financial clearance. Students who will be reimbursed by their employers upon satisfactory completion of course work may defer up to 75% of their tuition by providing evidence of their employer's approval and intent to pay. You are required to pay all fees and costs not covered by your employer prior to the beginning of the term.

Installment Payment Plan

The College allows students to arrange for payment of tuition in monthly installments over the course of the semester. Students may obtain an application from the Office of Financial Services 202/884-9530. In order to take full advantage of this plan, you should obtain materials and apply by July 1. There is a fee for participation, but there are no interest charges. The plan is not available for Summer, May, Winter, or other accelerated terms.

Scholarships and Grants

Financial aid awarded as a scholarship or grant will be deducted from the total amount you owe the College. However, you must arrange to pay the difference between any aid and the outstanding balance of your tuition and fees.

Student Loans

You must file a Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) and be registered for at least six credits to be considered for a federal student loan. Non-degree students or students who are not yet fully admitted are not eligible for a federal student loan; however, you may be eligible for a private loan program. You can obtain a FAFSA from Student Financial Services in 119 Main Hall. You should plan to file early – the application process takes approximately 8 weeks from the time you first file the FAFSA.

Veterans Benefits

Students entitled to benefits as veterans of the United States Armed Forces should contact the Academic Information Center at 202/884-9201 for information about eligibility and certification.

FINANCIAL CLEARANCE

It is vital that you attend Financial Clearance in O'Connor Auditorium during one of the times listed below; if you do not arrange for the payment of your tuition bill with Student Financial Services, you will be charged a late fee.

FINANCIAL RESPONSIBILITY

Financial obligations to Trinity College are governed by the principle of Honor. Fulfilling financial obligations is a matter of justice for the entire community, and failure to meet those obligations has severe consequences for the entire community.

Students are responsible for the timely payment of their accounts, even if parents, family members, employers, or others pay the bill. Students and families that need financial assistance are expected to work directly with the Office of Student Financial Services. These students are expected to complete their financial aid applications each year by the published deadlines. Book vouchers are a service the College provides to students who have a credit balance on their student accounts. Late financial aid applicants will not receive a book voucher.

Students with outstanding account balances will not have their course registrations processed until their financial obligations are satisfied or arrangements for payment have been made.

Trinity College reserves the right to refuse a payment plan if the prior financial conduct of the student or family indicates an inability or unwillingness to meet financial obligations to Trinity College in a timely way.

HOW TO REGISTER**ADVISING & COURSE SELECTION****College of Arts and Sciences**

All students should meet with their academic advisor to discuss academic plans for the upcoming semester. In this meeting, you should agree upon what courses you will take in the upcoming term, observing which courses fulfill degree, FLC, and elective requirements.

All students are encouraged to register online. Students who are unable to register online should complete a Registration Form, which must be signed by you and your advisor. In addition to indicating your course selections, be certain to include your current mailing and email addresses where indicated.

If you need assistance with the advising process, please contact the Associate Dean for Academic Advising in 369 Main, or call 202/884-9702.

School of Professional Studies

Undergraduate students should select courses that fulfill their academic program requirements and fit into their personal schedules. As you select courses be sure that you understand which courses fulfill Core, major, elective, or minor requirements. When planning your schedule, keep in mind that WEA courses meet every other weekend, WEB courses meet every weekend, EVC & WEC courses meet the first half of the semester, and EVD & WED courses meet the last seven half of the semester; EV courses meet in the evenings every week.

You should review both the catalog and the schedule to make sure that you have completed all appropriate prerequisites for the courses you have selected. Students are responsible for completing all prerequisites prior to enrolling in any course. Further, you should check the website, <http://campusweb.trinitydc.edu>, and click on "Schedule of Classes" to see if there are still openings in the classes you have selected. If you do not have access to the internet, you can call 202/884-9620 to verify class availability.

In order to register for classes, you may register online (see below) or you may complete a Registration Form, which asks for your current mailing address and email address as well as your course selections. Once you have filled out a Registration Form, you should contact your academic advisor in Room 250 to receive course registration approval 202/884-9620.

Graduate students should contact their advisor before registering. If you do not know who your advisor is, call 202/884-9620.

School of Education

Graduate students in the School of Education should contact their advisor to determine which courses they should take. It is important to have frequent contact with your advisor to ensure that you are meeting both degree and certification requirements.

Undergraduate students minoring in education or pursuing the B.A./M.A.T. Program should follow the registration procedures for

either the College of Arts and Sciences or the School of Professional Studies, as appropriate. Additionally, you should check with your advisor in the School of Education to verify that your undergraduate program will meet the general education requirements for teacher certification.

REGISTRATION

Registration Online

Online registration is encouraged for all students, especially those who spend a limited amount of time on campus. To register online follow these steps **after contacting your advisor**:

1. Go to the Trinity College Campus Web at <http://campusweb.trinitydc.edu>.
2. Click on Student Login.
3. Enter your Login ID and PIN. Your Login ID is your Social Security Number. Your PIN is the last four digits of your Social Security Number followed by the first initial of your first name in lower case (We recommend that you change your PIN after the first use. You can do this by going to My PIN).
4. Click to My Registration. Select classes by entering course numbers or searching by subject and/or times. Class sections must be entered in caps. After you make your first selection, add your next class. Do not click submit until you have made all your selections.
5. Submit your selections. Your course selections may be sent to your academic advisor (depending upon your academic status) for approval. Please be sure to check back on your registration status. Your registration must have a status of "registered" in order to be complete.
6. Contact Student Financial Services at 202/884-9530 to make a Payment Arrangement.

Registration in Person or by FAX

You should return your completed and signed Registration Form to the Academic Information Center (formerly the Registrar's Office) in 154 Main. Forms may also be sent by FAX 202/884-9524. Keep one copy for your own records. Incomplete or unsigned forms cannot be processed so please double-check your Registration Form to make sure it is filled out correctly. Schedule confirmations will be forwarded to the address you provide.

Additionally, you must submit a Payment Arrangement Form to the Business Office for your Registration to be processed. You should also check your account balance with Student Financial Services. If you have an account balance due, you may be unable to complete your registration.

SCHEDULE CHANGES

SCHEDULE ADJUSTMENT PERIOD

You are permitted to alter the courses you are taking without incurring additional charges during the Schedule Adjustment Period, generally the first 10-14 days of a regular semester (Note: the Schedule Adjustment Period varies by term, see the calendars on page 2 for details). During this period you may drop a course that you are registered for or add a course to your current schedule. *After the Course Schedule Adjustment Period has elapsed you will be charged for any course for which you are registered, and a record of these courses will appear on your official transcript.*

WITHDRAWING FROM COURSES

Withdrawing from a course or all courses after the Schedule Adjustment Period constitutes an academic action only; you will be charged for any course for which you are registered even if you withdraw from it. To withdraw from a course, you must fill out a Schedule Adjustment Form and obtain the signatures of your advisor and your course instructor, who will assign a grade of WP ("Withdraw Pass") or WF ("Withdraw Fail"). You may not withdraw from a course after the Withdrawal deadline (Note: the Withdrawal deadline varies by term, see the Academic Calendar on page 7 for details).

Room Assignments

Room assignments are posted in the Well near the main entrance to Main Hall. Students, faculty, and staff may also refer to room assignments on Trinity's web site at <http://www.trinitydc.edu>.

Cancellation of Courses

Occasionally it is necessary to cancel a scheduled course because of low enrollment, emergency staffing changes, or other unavoidable reasons. Every effort is made to announce a cancellation before the first class meeting, but this is not always possible. If a course is cancelled, a student who does not choose to transfer to another course may receive a full refund of the tuition and fees paid for the cancelled course by completing a refund request form in the Business Office.

Emergency/Weather Cancellation of Courses

Classes at Trinity College are expected to meet according to the announced schedule. Unless cancellation of classes is announced publicly through the usual local communication media, classes will meet. When cancellation of classes is necessary, instructors are expected to arrange additional readings, study assignments, or class meetings to compensate for the lost time in class. COMPUTER CENTER

With your valid ID, you may use Trinity's Computer Center, located in the Science Building, Room 119. The Center provides students with numerous software packages, access to the World Wide Web, laser printing, and technology assistance from trained staff members. EMAIL

Trinity provides you with an email account that allows you to receive information about exciting events and activities in the Trinity Community. To activate your account, please contact Technology Services at 202/884-9811.

GRADES/TRANSCRIPTS

Grades are sent to your mailing address at the conclusion of each term and are issued by the Office of the Registrar, 154 Main Hall. You may also obtain a copy of your official transcript for a \$5 fee from the same office. Phone 202/884-9201.

LIBRARY SERVICES

The Sister Helen Sheehan Library houses over 200,000 volumes with an online catalog system and internet access to thousands of research institutions and libraries worldwide. Visit the library front desk to activate your borrowing privileges and to receive a barcode for your College ID card. You must always present a College ID to enter the library, and no library resources may be checked out without an ID with a valid barcode.

PICTURE IDENTIFICATION

A key component of our security on campus is for all students, faculty, and staff to carry their Trinity College Identification card while on campus. In order to provide for a safe and comfortable learning community, the Campus Safety Office checks ID cards for all people entering campus buildings.

Photos for Trinity College IDs will be taken during Financial Clearance. If you miss financial clearance, please visit Student Financial Services for a student card that can be taken to the basement mailroom to have an ID made. A \$15 fee is assessed to replace lost or stolen ID cards.

PARKING

Parking stickers may be purchased and received during Financial Clearance. Stickers may also be obtained from the Campus Safety Office in the basement of Main Hall. Students may park only in lots zoned for students; parking restrictions are enforced regularly, and violations will result in fines, which will be assessed to your student account.

PLACEMENT TESTING & TUTORING

If you are uncertain about which entry-level mathematics, English, or language classes to take, you should contact Academic Support Services for placement testing in 350 Main Hall, 202/884-9636. Academic Support Services also provides tutoring assistance and study skills seminars.

WRITING CENTER

The Writing Center, located in 115 Science Building, offers a free on-campus service that comfortably welcomes students, faculty, and staff to talk – most often one-to-one – about a particular piece of writing, writing habits or patterns of thinking, and how to meet our aspirations as writers.
