HOW TO REGISTER

Advising and Course Selection

College of Arts and Sciences

All students should contact their academic advisor to discuss academic plans for the upcoming semester. In consultation with your advisor, you should agree upon the courses you will take in the upcoming term, observing which courses fulfill degree, Foundation for Leadership Curriculum (FLC), and elective requirements. If you need assistance with the advising process, contact the Associate Dean for Academic Advising in 369 Main, or call 202/884-9709.

School of Professional Studies

Undergraduate students should review their academic plans with their advisor before registering. In consultation with your advisor, you should select courses that fulfill your academic program requirements and fit into your schedule. As you select courses, be sure that you understand which courses fulfill Core, major, elective, or minor requirements. You should also review the catalog and the schedule to make sure that you have completed all appropriate prerequisites for the courses you have selected. Contact your academic advisor in Room 250 to receive course registration approval at 202/884-9620.

Graduate students should contact their advisor before registering. If you do not know who your advisor is, call 202/884-9620.

School of Education

Graduate students in the School of Education should contact their advisor to determine which courses they should take. It is important to have frequent contact with your advisor to ensure that you are meeting both degree and certification requirements.

Undergraduate students minoring in education should follow the registration procedures for the College of Arts and Sciences. Students pursuing the B.A./M.A.T. Program should follow the registration procedures for the School of Professional Studies, as appropriate. Additionally, you should check with your advisor in the School of Education to verify that your undergraduate program will meet the general education requirements for teacher certification. Returning Student Registration

All continuing students must access registration using IQ.Web at www.trinitydc.edu/igweb. This link has an IQ.Web Help Guide and a Help Form to use if you have lost your username or password.

IQ.Web uses a shopping cart function similar to many retail web sites. Remember that if courses are still in your shopping cart, you have not actually "purchased" them yet! Please stop by the Registrar's Office in Main 154 or call us at 202/884-9200 if you need help registering.

New Student Registration

New students must register in person or by fax. Please refer to your admission letter for instructions about contacting your advisor and registering.

COURSE AND SCHEDULE INFORMATION

Add/Drop Period

You are permitted to alter the courses you are taking in IQ.Web without incurring additional charges during the Add/Drop Period. (See the deadline calendar in this scheduling booklet for add/drop dates). During this period you may drop a course that you are registered for or add a course to your current schedule. After the Add/Drop Period has elapsed, you will be charged for any course for which you are registered, and a record of these courses will appear on your official transcript.

Withdrawing From Courses

Once the Add/Drop period has passed, a course may not be removed from a student's academic record for any reason. Students may, however, still withdraw from a course at any time up to the deadline for withdrawal; dates are listed in the calendar. When a student withdraws from a course, a designation of "W" (Withdrawal) will appear on the student's transcript. Students who fail to withdraw officially or to meet course requirements are subject to receive a grade of "F" (Fail). Students are responsible for payment for courses from which they have withdrawn. Financial aid recipients who withdraw are subject to federal refund and repayment requirements. To withdraw from a course, students should follow this procedure:

- Obtain Schedule Adjustment Form in the Registrar's Office or at www.trinitydc.edu/academics/registrar.
- Fill out and sign relevant sections of the Schedule Adjustment Form.
- Confer with advisor to discuss how withdrawing from the course will affect academic plans. Obtain the signature of student's academic advisor.
- Return signed form to the Office of the Registrar.
- The Registrar will enter a grade of "W" for the course on your transcript.

Room Assignments

Room assignments are posted in the Well near the main entrance to Main Hall as well as on IQ.Web. Room assignments will change during the first week of class. Check IQ.Web before the first meeting of your class to confirm the room assignment.

Cancellation of Courses

Occasionally it is necessary to cancel a scheduled course because of low enrollment, emergency staffing changes, or other unavoidable reasons. Every effort is made to announce a cancellation before the first class meeting, but this is not always possible. If a course is cancelled, a student who does not choose to transfer to another course may receive a full refund of the tuition and fees paid for the cancelled course.

Emergency/Weather Class Cancellations

Classes at Trinity University are expected to meet according to the announced schedule. Unless cancellation of classes is announced publicly through the local communication media and at www.trinitydc.edu, classes will meet. When cancellation of classes is necessary, instructors are expected to arrange additional readings, study assignments, or class meetings to compensate for the lost time in class. The emergency/weather cancellation number is 202/884-9009.

PAYMENT INFORMATION

You will receive a confirmation statement of your term and total charges in the mail. You may also view your student account in IQ.Web. Students are expected to pay all fees and any previous balances in full, or to make satisfactory arrangements for payment, before the first day of classes. Students without a payment arrangement by the first day of class will be charged a late fee. If you have questions or concerns about your payment, please contact the Office of Student Financial Services at 202/884-9530.

Methods of Payment

Check or Money Order

Checks should be made payable to Trinity University and sent to the Business Office, Trinity University, 125 Michigan Avenue, N.E., Washington, DC 20017. Make sure to include daytime telephone number on your check.

Credit Cards

You may pay for your tuition and fees at the Business Office using a credit card. Trinity University accepts MasterCard, Visa, and Discover. There is an additional charge of \$30 if payment is made in two installments. You may pay by phone at 202/884-9527.

Employer Vouchers

Trinity University also accepts employer vouchers from companies that assist their employees with tuition. If your employer provides financial assistance, you will need to submit a voucher every semester to generate employer billing at the time you seek financial clearance. Students are required to pay all fees and costs not covered by their employer prior to the beginning of the term.

Installment Payment Plan

The University allows students to arrange for payment of tuition in monthly installments over the course of the semester. There is a fee for participation, but there are no interest charges. The plan is not available for Summer, May, Winter, or other accelerated terms. Please contact Student Financial Services at financialaid@trinitydc.edu or 202/884-9530 for more information.

FINANCIAL AID

Trinity provides financial aid through its endowed scholarships, loan funds, and its allocation of non-endowed operating revenues. It also administers funds available through federal programs. Individuals should also seek aid from state and local programs for which they are eligible. Currently, about 90% of the student body receives some type of financial assistance.

Applying for Financial Aid

To apply for financial aid, you must complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) or Renewal FAFSA. Trinity University's school code is 001460. An application may be completed online at <http://www.fafsa.ed.gov>. The priority deadline for the fall semester is April 1. Students beginning their academic program in the spring semester should file the FAFSA by October 1 of the previous year. Veterans Benefits

Students entitled to benefits as veterans of the United States Armed Forces should contact the Office of Student Financial Services at 202/884-9530 for information about eligibility and certification.

FINANCIAL RESPONSIBILITY

Financial obligations to Trinity University are governed by the principle of Honor. Fulfilling financial obligations is a matter of justice for the entire community, and failure to meet those obligations has severe consequences for the entire community.

Students are responsible for the timely payment of their accounts, even if parents, family members, employers, or others pay the bill. Students and families that need financial assistance are expected to work directly with the Office of Student Financial Services. These students are expected to complete their financial aid applications each year by the published deadlines. Book vouchers are a service the University provides to students who have a credit balance on their student accounts. Late financial aid applicants will not receive a book voucher.

Students with outstanding balances will not have their course registrations processed until their financial obligations are satisfied or arrangements for payment have been made. Trinity University reserves the right to refuse a payment plan if the prior financial conduct of the student or family indicates an inability or unwillingness to meet financial obligations to Trinity University in a timely way.

ADMISSION

If you are interested in applying to a degree program or simply taking courses at Trinity University, the following information will aid you in completing the application for admission and other required materials. For complete details, please refer to the application packet, which may be requested by calling the Office of Admissions at 202/884-9400. Application materials may also be obtained online at <http://www.trinitydc.edu>.

Admission Requirements

The requirements for admission vary by academic program, and complete details for each program may be obtained by contacting the Office of Admissions. All undergraduate applicants must have a high school diploma or a GED; applicants to graduate programs must have a minimum undergraduate GPA of 2.8 on a 4.0 scale from a regionally accredited college or university. The following materials are required for admission into any program:

- A completed and signed Application Form
- A nonrefundable application fee of \$40
- An essay or statement of purpose
- One or more letters of recommendation
- Official copies of academic records or transcripts

The School of Education also requires scores from the PRAXIS I Examination. Certain programs also require standardized test scores and a personal interview. Applicants should check with the Office of Admissions for specific requirements.

Courses at the 600-level are reserved for graduate students.

Session indicates the session in which the course is offered: semester, Term 1, or Term 2

Section indicates:

- Special locations (ARC), course formats (BBD, or online courses) or cohorts
- Section number when two or more sections of the same course are offered

Course Title lists the name of the course

Day indicates which day(s) the course meets

Time refers to course meeting hours

Instructor lists the faculty member teaching the course

Cr. indicates how many credits the course carries

Notes indicates:

- Cross listings
- Information about the course that the instructor wants to communicate to students
- Fees associated with laboratory or other course activities
